

# SEE THE SCENIC SIERRAS

ACBS Annual Meeting and Boat Show Lake Tahoe 2006

The Hyatt Regency Lake Tahoe, Incline Village, Nevada, will be your meeting headquarters, with the Sierra Boat Company hosting the annual boat show. Arrive on September 10<sup>th</sup> to insure your spot in the pre-events. The Northern Calif./Lake Tahoe chapter is now planning your pre-show events for Monday, September 11<sup>th</sup>, Tuesday the 12<sup>th</sup> and Wednesday the 13<sup>th</sup>. The annual meeting will take place Thursday, September 14<sup>th</sup> and the boat show the 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup>.

Lake Tahoe was first visited by the Washoe Indian tribe 10,000 years ago. They are still present here at the lake. Captain John Fremont was the first Euro-American to see the lake in 1844 followed by gold seekers in 1849. Lake Tahoe's elevation is 6,225 feet, its length is 22 miles and its width is 12 miles. The surface area is 192 square miles; the maximum depth is 1,645 feet and has a shoreline of 72 miles. You are invited to come FLOAT YOUR BOAT on 37 trillion gallons of water.

Play Golf? Incline Village is home to two golf courses, The *Mountain Course* and the *Championship Course*, a Robert Trent Jones Sr. creation. Both courses offer spectacular lake views. There are golf courses too numerous to list within a short drive of the hotel

Like heights? Visit Squaw Valley USA and take the tram to High Camp, Elevation 8200 for a view without end. While there, have lunch, take a dip in the swimming pool or try ice skating at 8200 feet.





#### Fall Workshop 2005

Workshops which have been offered by our club have numbered amongst my favorite events. I think one of the reasons I enjoy these sessions is because they offer a way for me to embrace the local wooden boat activity during the off season. Let me begin with a word of thanks to the organizer of the most recent workshop activity, Jack Hughes, as well as once again Steve Flewitt for providing his wonderful facility for us to meet in, not to mention his presence and the vast knowledge he graciously offers up.

As a brief update, an earlier workshop had been contemplated at a warehouse facility containing holdings of the Museum of Science and Technology. Within their collection of artifacts not currently on exhibit, are apparently a number of items germane to our interests. These are likely un-restored, catalogued items from various bequeaths or other museum acquisitions. This collection is purported to contain various marine propulsion examples, including an assortment of outboards. Regrettably and I suppose understandably, the logistics involved in bringing a couple of dozen or more members of the public into such a facility can prove to be a nightmare, particularly with the degree of governmental protocol involved. Hopefully someday a greater portion of the Museum's collection will find its way to the public view.

Our Fall 2005 MCBC Workshop held on Saturday, November 12<sup>th</sup> covered the broad topic of boat electrical wiring. It was a well attended event by our membership, including new member Bert deVry. As both a retired electrical engineer, and former sailor, Bert brought to our group some interesting perspectives on the subject matter for our session, as well as a large collection of boat electrical systems and related publications. Discussions covered the use of modern materials, regulatory issues, wiring techniques, as well as dangerous malfunctions caused by electrical wiring problems.

I have participated in MCBC workshop events consisting of organized presentations, demonstrations and lectures, as well as roundtable forums, of which this latest event most closely resembled. Both work well however we rely heavily on the keenness of the group on the given topic, plus the ability of the facilitator to spin out some constructive and thought provoking discussions.

It goes without saying that these workshop events are popular amongst our membership. Organizing successful sessions on a recurring basis takes a committed effort, not to mention some creativity to come up with winning ideas in the first place. If any amongst our readership have ideas or suggestions for interesting workshops, I am certain they would be most welcomed by our organizers and appreciated by our membership.

#### Manners, Rules and Common Sense

I've done a few dumb things in boats (all right, all right, calm down!) but I'm not going to provide details here. My booboos were usually not bad manners, they were ineptitude. I want to talk about manners.

We have all seen and read about some really dumb actions by boat drivers. In particular, I recall a couple of dumb things I witnessed that bothered the Rideau Canal staff, and I really hate that. In general, MCBC members and the canal staff get along really well and we need to do what we can to avoid eroding that relationship even if it comes to educating other boaters.

One of the cases involved a fast boat that shot out of a lock from the third position back when the gates were about half open. The lock staff were really angry, as were the other boaters who rightfully should have been allowed to exit the lock in order. Plus their boats were endangered.

The other case involved a boater who drove with a pretty wide-open throttle approaching a lock station, blowing past a Canal work boat with a barge in tow, and maintaining speed and generating a significant swell well into the lock approach area where other boats were alongside. Mighty were the arm wavings and shoutings from the shore and the barge, and lots of lips were moving!

I think we need to curb this sort of action. I don't enjoy this kind of stuff myself, and I hate to see other folks around us being angered by the actions of other boaters. We as MCBC members need to take it upon ourselves to educate those boaters who seem to not know proper waterways etiquette. This need not be done in a confrontational manner. Just explain their faux pas and suggest how to avoid it in the future.

And set an example. If you are in the area of locks or other marine activity, slow down and be seen to be cautious. Don't showboat. Take care to obey speed limits and nowake areas. Keep to the right side of the channel. Let's all show we know what we're doing and that we know and care about the rules.

#### ONTARIO MOVES TO PROTECT THE LOCAL ENVIRONMENT

The Ontario government has directed Conservation Authorities (CAs) to amend their flood plain regulations to include protection for wetlands, valley lands and lake shores within their watershed jurisdictions. The amended regulation is known as the *Generic Regulation* because it creates a uniform set of rules for use in all CAs across Ontario.

The changes come into effect in May 2006 in all areas of the province.


This *Generic Regulation* gives CAs the ability to regulate and protect the local environment in a number of ways. The amendments will complement and expand environmental protection to eventually include wetlands and valley lands in addition to flood plains and watercourses throughout the Mississippi and Rideau valleys. This expanded protection regime will be phased in over several years.

In the early stages after May 2006, protection of provincially significant wetlands currently identified on municipal Official Plan maps will be the priority. As surveys and background work permit, other wetland areas and valley slopes will be included. The province's intention is to have more control of sensitive wetland areas and other zones that have an effect on the quality and quantity of water available or other environmental functions.

At the same time, development restrictions on mapped flood plain areas will help prevent loss of life and property as we move into a period of increasing climate change and severe weather phenomena such as heavy unseasonable rainfall and floods. Flood plain mapping will be extended to include several new areas in the Rideau Valley including about 2 km upstream of Glen Tay on the Tay River, about 5 km of new mapping on Steven's Creek in rural Ottawa, almost 7 km of new mapping on Kemptville Creek up to the Oxford Mills Dam, 20 km of new mapping on the Jock River upstream to Ashton, and the long-awaited 54 km of new mapping of the Ottawa River shore between Shirley's Bay and the Clarence-Rockland boundary in the east. Mississippi Valley Conservation's floodplain mapping will be extended to include Dalhousie Lake and Constance Creek.

Four public Information Sessions were recently held to show the new maps and discuss the amended regulations with landowners and concerned citizens. About 120 people were present to discuss the *Generic Regulation* and its impact on their properties in the area. The final touches are now being made to the local package of changes.
